### **Ground Force Task - Cricket Copse**



You will recall the article in our April issue, which described the tidying up operation undertaken by Eastleigh Borough Councils Countryside Project, where the woodland areas around Cranborne Gardens were given a makeover.

The entrance to North Millers Dale from the Hursley Road entrance was considerably improved with coppicing and hedge planting by Nick Webb's team on the weekend of 17th March, The project team promised us that improvements would not end there, and as promised the team returned to take on an

improvement at Cricket Copse.

Improvements included hedge planting, laying path gravel, and erecting small entrance signs and path trimming

### The Seamier Side of North Millers Dale

The Millers Tales does its best to give you positive information about North Millers Dale, and provide a focal point for community issues and community functions.

Unfortunately, that sometimes extends to reporting instances that happen on our doorstep which are unfortunate and distasteful for the residents concerned, but can act as a word of warning for everyone else.

### Lock your doors and take extra care! Thieves at large!

It has been reported to the Millers Tale that one family in Ashbridge Rise has had two instances where their property has been compromised during November. In the first instance, a socket set and a screwdriver set were found to be missing from the garage.

Our local policeman PC Boyd attended very quickly after it was reported, gave advice on security and generally restored the families confidence. Following the incident, the family also received a letter from Victim Support in Eastleigh which was a welcome boost and made them feel they were not alone, the larger community was looking out for them.

Unfortunately about a week later, the family was

revisited by the thieves, and came home to find their back door had been forced open and the lock broken. Surprisingly, having gone to the trouble of forcing the door, nothing appeared to have been stolen from the house.

It was clear the thieves scaled a wall and a garden hedge to gain entry into an enclosed back garden and then proceeded to force the back door. A locked garage, and a locked side gate were clearly no deterrent. Does it sound as though this could happen to you? I am sure that for most of us on Millers Dale this could be true.

Please take this as a warning, especially at Christmas, when we all have lots to do and will have more valuables in our houses. If there are thieves about, then do not make it easy for them. Lock your doors, windows and garages and protect your belongings and be safe. This family was lucky that nothing of great value was stolen, but it could have been very different.

#### Vandalism

Much more visible and just as distressing for those who are victims, is vandalism on the estate

Again, recent instances of vandalism in the area of Rosemoor Grove and The Tanyards have been brought to our attention. One property has had eggs thrown, and the garden fence vandalised on three occasions in the past month. The last incident was the worst, causing over £1000 of damage The police have been involved and a police incident number allocated to it. The police were very supportive, and are encouraging everyone on the estate to report any such incidents to them.

The vandalism incidents have also been reported to Eastleigh Borough Council (Councillors Davidovitz and Wellfare). Following this contact, Councillor Davidovitz suggested that a meeting take place in the Millers Dale Centre to discuss these issues, and anyone who has a concern about security, vandalism or any other police matter should attend.

No date has been decided for this meeting yet, but please look out for information leaflets or notes through your door from the NMDCA, for details of the proposed date of the meeting. It may be that by working together we can identify trends of vandalism, or recognise who was out at those times the incidents take place.

If you are concerned by recent events, have information, or just wish to hear what is going on to give us extra protection, please come along to the meeting

We have said before, HELP US TO HELP YOU. Next time it could be you whose back door is forced open or your fence vandalised. Let's try to make Millers Dale a pleasant and safe place to live.

### Steaming interests from Barry Eagles



Barry Eagles has a lifetime's interest in railways and shipping. He started by collecting information and has progressed to documenting his extensive knowledge in books, stories, videos and cuttings.

Southampton is famous for its ships and Barry is very familiar with the Shield Hall that is moored in Southampton docks. This ship is kept afloat through the work of its Preservation Society, of which he is proud to be Chairman. Recently it won a lottery grant of £260 k. It is the largest working steam powered vessel preserved in the UK and has to comply with the same legislation as any other boat. For example the master has to be certificated.

Messrs Lobnitz built the Shield Hall in 1915 in Glasgow. The design is twin screws that are driven from a triple expansion tank steam engine that is fired by oil. Earlier ships using this type of engine had been fired by coal but by the 1920's such ships were being converted to oil fired.

The ship was built as a sludge carrier for the "Glasgow Conservancy", or as I think of it the Glasgow sewage works. It was later bought by Southern Water to do the same job for Southampton and then sold to the Solent Steam Packet Company.

It was one of the last traditional steam ships built. Only a few ships were built from a similar technology after Shield Hall and they were either ferries for Istanbul or ships for the Central Electricity Board.

If you haven't seen it perhaps now you will.





On Valentine's Day morning the postmaster is greeted by a sea of red envelopes when he arrives at work, all of which need to be sorted by hand.


Will your mail get to your loved one on time?

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
The post office recommends that one writes:

- . Name
- House number and street name
- Locality name (if there is one)
- POSTTOWN (in capital letters)
  - POSTCODE (in capital letters)

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### AREA CO-ORDINATOR'S REPORT By Andy Milner

Ashdown Road Environmental Improvements

Following extensive public consultation last year, the long awaited environmental improvements have taken place at Ashdown Road shops. Funded jointly by the owners and from the Council's Community Investment Programme, the workers focused on improving access for disabled persons. With ample parking to the rear of the shops the slight reduction in bays at the front was considered by most to justify the provision of disabled bays outside the post office. Further features were being built in to the scheme to provide more help for the elderly including additional handrails and white lines to highlight the edge of the steps.

### Hiltingbury Lakes

Extensive improvements to commemorate the Queen's Golden Jubilee are now being completed at Hiltingbury Lakes. addition to repairs to the banking of the upper lake, footpath improvements have been effected on the path leading down to Merdon Avenue. On 17th November, a clearing party prepared the ground for planting of trees, bulbs and wild flowers. It is hoped to recruit local volunteers as 'Friends of the Lakes' to help with the clearing. It is hoped to engage the services of local school children in the planting and others in the sponsorship of other features around the lakes. If you would like to sponsor a seat (£630), plant a tree (£50) or plant a whip of native species (£2.50) then you should also contact Andy Milner.

### Waitrose

The Waitrose development is seeing a number of highway improvements along Oakmount Road and the Local Area Committee is committed to investing £200,000 in an environmental improvement scheme to improve the facade along Winchester Road from the Hill Way to Fryern Arcade. Discussions with local traders are well advanced and details of the approved scheme will be made available to the general public as soon as these are available.

A further £100,000 is being made available to provide traffic management measures in the area to address safety concerns associated with the store and to protect the local residential amenity. A consultation group incorporating local traders and residents has been meeting over the summer months.

### Pennine Way

A consultation exercise on the future of the Pennine Way play area has been undertaken with local residents including a special questionnaire for under 16's who used the play equipment before it was damaged by fire last year. The results of the survey will be reported back to the Local Area Committee and they will make a decision on it's future. Ideas so far include replacement of the damaged equipment, the addition of a footpath from Pennine Way to Stourvale gardens and work to address long-standing drainage problems in the area.

### **Bournemouth Road**

Local residents have regularly suffered delays along Bournemouth Road with unloading at local shops and garages. This combined with the general width restriction along the road and various sets of traffic lights has often resulted in considerable congestion and delays. The Local Area Committee has been working closely with local traders in an attempt to overcome the problem and has received considerable

support from the One Stop shop, who have carefully reviewed their procedures, and Hendy Ford who have additional resources manage the positioning of car transporters off the main road. Recent works to Keble Close have also benefited local residents who used to suffer with traffic heading for industrial estate the erroneously making the wrong turning. We will continue to look at ways of enforcing better driving practices along this stretch of Bournemouth Road including the enforcement of no right turn into and from Brickfield Lane, which is still abused by smaller vehicles.

### Chandlers Ford Railway Station

Plans are going ahead to re-open Chandlers Ford railway station in May 2003 and a circular line would operate between Romsey, Chandlers Ford, Eastleigh, St Denys, Southampton, Millbrook, Redbridge and Totton.

### Valley Park Link

An idea has been put forward to open a link between Shannon Way into South Millers Dale/ Hursley Road in an effort to reduce traffic using Baddesley Road. If a link road was introduced, it could reduce the traffic problem on the NMD estate, although it may well move the problem elsewhere.

### Neighbourhood Watch

Do you have a Neighbourhood Watch operating in your area? If not, please think about it. Chandler's Ford and Hiltingbury has suffered from a high proportion of domestic burglaries over the last few years and there is irrefutable evidence that neighbourhood watch programmes act as a real deterrent to crime.
