It was founded by Anita Clark following a conversation with Ginny Straker a former breast care nurse at The Royal Hampshire County Hospital. Ginny mentioned to Anita whether she would consider starting a group for those living with Breast Cancer in the area. The local vicar from Christ Church then, Eddie Shirras, kindly offered that the group could meet at the church for free! Ginny organised the first Breast Cancer Support meeting on the 3rd Dec 1987 and it ran for many years.

Neighbourhood Watch have worked with HantsPol CyberCrime Unit to launch the 'Hampshire Cyber Watch' initiative - a team of volunteer Cyber Champions trained to help fight cyber-crime across Hampshire. Our Cyber Champions will:

- Give direct help to anyone who is concerned about communications they have received, or believe they may be a victim of cyber-crime.
- Increase awareness of cyber-crime by giving talks to groups to spread the word about scams and ways to help keep safe online.



HantsPol Cybercrime Unit have so far vetted and trained 12 Neighbourhood Watch volunteers across Hampshire, (2 in Chandler's Ford) to become Cyber Champions to launch this service that is offered to any individual living in Hampshire (over the age of 13).

We can help you if:

- You think your computer has been 'hacked'
- Someone is asking you to pay a ransom
- You have received malicious messages
- You think you may have been targeted by fraud or scams
- You have lost information that could affect your privacy

- 3.24 million fraud incidents in 2018 of those frauds 54% were cyber related
- 1.23 million other cyber crimes (computer misuse)

- The impact can be devastating particularly where your personal data is exposed or you suffer significant financial loss
- Many of these offences could be easily prevented.



After an absence of around thirty years, the lock down focused my mind on returning to painting. My paints and brushes had been in the loft since then, so I presumed they would probably not be very usable any more. I had dabbled in drawing and a bit of art on the computer having, some time ago, invested in a Wacom pressure sensitive tablet.

With more time on my hands, I researched what was currently available in the way of software and after watching a few tutorials on YouTube, found that there were a few programmes used by serious artists. Well, the top of the range was Photoshop CC, but at around £250, that wasn't a contender.

Two other systems came near to the top of the pile and remarkably they were both free. Autodesk Sketchbook is a very good drawing programme which I still use, but to my mind the most powerful yet easy to master package, was Krita. It is an open source programme written by artists for artists, so lots of people have contributed towards making it. I tried to discover the background to the name, and the word 'Krita' appears to be of Indian origin, meaning 'made by self'.

Watercolour is my favourite medium. There are numerous techniques to help achieve a variety of textures. One example is to sprinkle sea salt onto a wet watercolour wash and leave to dry, (a hairdryer helps to speed up the process) then remove the salt. The salt soaks up the pigment and produces a granular almost snowflake effect. Splattering is another technique and it's relatively old toothbrush. Black, soluble ink pens are another favourite - the pigments bleed out when water is applied and the colours are quite

By Charles Lewry I've had one or two people asking if we were planning to relaunch the walking group and I thought seriously about it. I have been in touch with Wendy Sheaf of Health Walk Eastleigh Council as we are affiliated with their Health Walks scheme to see what the official advice is.

Up until recently, it was that groups of five plus one leader could walk together suitably distanced. If more than six, then separate walks with other leaders starting and ending in different places could be possible. Eastleigh had trialled the walks in Chandler's Ford with a booking system to ensure groups did not exceed the limit.

Now that the numbers of infections seem to be rising again, I think the risks are becoming greater than the advantages, so have decided not to go ahead for the time being. I plan to review the situation again in maybe a couple of months' time, and hope that we can get back out as a group to enjoy the walking and each other's company in the fresh air.
