Further to the work that was carried out on the paths in the Flexford reserve, we noticed, in the minutes of the Local Area Committee, that £455 has been allocated by Eastleigh Borough Council to install a dual waste bin in the reserve. This will be very welcome as it is a popular route for dog walkers.

We have been assured that the Council have been working hard to get some sort of bus service in NMD resumed. It is going to be a minibus which is due to start on 17th July. The route as yet, has not been published, so we don't know how close it will come to NMD.

A recent update on Facebook said:"We are still anticipating that the new service will start on 17th July. We can't confirm the timetable yet, because it is with the Traffic Commissioner for approval".





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A street BBQ is an annual event in **Weaver's Place**, (Covid permitting) and whilst this was earlier in the year than usual, the weather didn't disappoint. We set up two BBQs, one for meat and one for vegetarians and, as is normal, the men gathered around to cook/cremate food for the rest of the family.

Being a cul-de-sac lends itself to our yearly gathering, and the parking bay at the top is ideal for dining, whilst the adjacent green is great for the kids. A couple of gazebos were erected to keep off the sun/rain and long trestle tables to eat at. Everybody brought their own meat and supplied salads and puddings to share.

A couple of very young entrepreneurs decided to ply everybody with toasted marshmallows after the main cooking had finished, and felt that it was a fledgling business opportunity waiting to be exploited! Some neighbours have lived in Weaver's Place since the houses were built, but others had more recently moved in, so it was a good opportunity to get to know them. Guide Dogs need people who can be a Fosterer for a training dog for around 20 weeks, transporting them to school (our centre in Chandlers Ford), whilst they are doing their all-important training, to become a guide dog to help someone with sight loss. What you get back is an enormous sense of pride, as you watch them develop through

Guide Dogs will also cover all food, veterinary and pet insurance costs associated with the dog in training, meaning you get all the benefits of a dog without the added cost implications.

If you work full-time, this opportunity could be ideal for you, as our dog staff are ready to receive the dogs between 08:00 and 09:00 every morning, where they spend their day with us until home-time, between 16:00 and 18:00.

Mark, one of our volunteers, describes his new role:

"I recently became a Volunteer Fosterer for Guide Dogs South West, and this little beauty is Tilley!

My working day now includes dropping her off in the morning and picking her up later in the day from 'school', the Guide Dogs centre here in Chandlers Ford. It's so nice having Tilley in





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our lives and to be doing something so worthwhile.

Due to my career change starting <u>Mark's Your Man</u>, we haven't been able to have a dog since losing our beloved Jack over 3 years ago. So, this is a wonderful compromise, with the added bonus that Guide Dogs cover all costs and provide respite with other volunteers for holidays."

Claire Rossall, Volunteering Coordinator at Guide Dogs Southampton, said: "Being a Fosterer is such a rewarding role, and you really will be making a huge impact in getting our dogs well on their way to becoming life-changers. Even from your first day, you will never be alone. We have dedicated volunteer managers who will support you throughout your volunteering journey. They are always on hand to answer any questions that you might have, and offer training right from the start.

We also have a massive community of volunteers, so you are really joining the Guide Dogs family when you become a volunteer. It gives you the opportunity to socialise and meet fellow Fosterers in your area."

A UK-wide charity with a community team based in Chandlers Ford, Southampton, Guide Dogs helps people with sight loss to live the life they choose, and to step out into the world with confidence.


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DRAPERS TO RENEW THEIR ASSOCIATION WITH SOUTHAMPTON FC

Did you know Chandler's Ford-based tool firm Draper Tools is over 100 years old? Established in 1919 by Bert Draper, the business is still family owned and run today by the third and fourth generation of the Draper family. With over a century of history behind it, the company isn't slowing down and remains as committed to growth and innovation

History & heritage

- Draper Tools started life in 1919 with founder Bert Draper selling at markets in the Kingston Upon Thames area.
- The company moved to its current head office site in Chandler's Ford in 1963, so celebrates 60 years on the site.
- Prior to becoming home to Draper Tools, the Chandler's Ford site was a royal navy victualling depot. It was used as the central stores for the shadow factories



producing spitfires during World War 2. The shadow factories were small manufacturing units producing aircraft parts dotted allround the Southampton area in an attempt to escape the axis bombing raids.

When Bert Draper passed away in 1963, control of the Company passed to his son Norman, who grew the business together with his wife Joan, who produced, almost single-handedly, the company's first type-written catalogue.

People, partnerships & the future

- Today the company, overseen by Norman's son, John and his grandsons, Tom
- Many local people will remember Draper Tools as proud sponsors of Southampton FC in the 80s and 90s. As of June 2023, Draper Tools is back as an official partner to the club, with a logo featuring on the Men's First Team Backof-Shirt, as well as the Southampton FC Women's Back-of-Shorts.
- Draper also has partnerships in place with Santa Pod Raceway, and the successful British Touring Car Championship team, EXCELR8 Motorsport.



Growth & looking to the future

- In 2006 Draper Tools purchased an additional site in North Baddesley to continue its plans for growth, initial building work was completed in 2009.
- 2018 saw significant international expansion for Draper with Holland's Delta International becoming part of the Draper family.
- In 2019 the company marked its centenary year with a huge family fun day for current and former staff. It was a day of celebration to thank everyone



involved in the success of the business as well as a day of giving back, with a special donation made to the charity 'Care for Veterans'.

- In 2021 Draper Tools released its first annual sustainability & ethics update - detailing the company's environmental journey covering everything from recycling to reducing plastics.
- The company currently employs over 300 people both locally, around the UK and overseas.
