Movement, the Jamboree is the world's largest youth camp. Jamborees are held every four years. 40,000 young people and leaders from 150 countries attended the event, with the aim to

share culture, experiences, and friendship, and put global citizenship into practice.


You may have read in the national press that this was a nightmare for many British Scouts. Unfortunately, the vast camp site, held on reclaimed land at Saemangeum prepared. Soon after arriving the scouts were met with inadequate conditions, such as insufficient and filthy sanitary conditions, no shade in the 40+ degrees, mosquito bites and minimal catering for anyone with food allergies. This meant the hospital became overwhelmed with admissions and all onsite activities were cancelled.

The situation then got worse when a typhoon was forecast to hit the region. The UK, USA Singaporean Scouts took the decision in the interest of the safety, to remove them from the site. The rest of the Scouts from across the globe soon followed and the jamboree was cancelled. A small army of busses were deployed and Adam and his fellow Scouts from Hampshire were taken to the capital city Seoul. As imagine to can accommodation for 5,000 UK scouts at short notice was a challenge. However, in true scout fashion, they overcame. Adam spent the first night sleeping on a ballroom floor in a 5* Hotel in his sleeping bag. Not as bad as it sounds as he was able to use the onsite Spa that evening to freshen up. The next day the hotel was able to provide bedrooms for scouts. Adam shared a room with two other scouts from Hampshire. This still meant they had wash and clean their clothes, but in their onsite bathroom!



The following days the UK Scout leaders continued to be amazing and put together an itinerary of events with no notice in and around Seoul. The South Korean people were very apologetic and embraced the Scouts from across the globe with big smiles and open arms. Over the following days a "K-Pop" concert was arranged, tickets to professional football club match, visits to temples/palaces and the South Korean Presidents' home amongst many other adventures.

This was a very different trip to what was planned, but as equally rewarding and exciting for Adam. He would do it again with a drop of a hat, if given the opportunity. He made some life long friends and learnt the value of being prepared, look after each other and remain positive. An inspiration to all of us!

The 44 Route is circular, starting and finishing in Eastleigh but going alternately clockwise then anticlockwise. This means that it will pass through North Miller's Dale on each route but in opposite directions.

You can get the bus to Eastleigh on either route, but the roads passed on the way will be different, as will the time taken for the journey. The first bus to Eastleigh is at 08:15, and the last bus home from Eastleigh leaves the bus station at 17:15. There are always extra containers there if you see something else you would like! Leah regularly does a price check with local supermarkets, to make sure her prices are fair.

We all need to do our bit to save on plastic waste and packaging and this is an easy way to do that. Do go along and see for yourself and take your children too. It is a little treasure in our local area.

LIFE'S BIN GOOD TO ME, THEY SAY

Depending on your perspective you may or may not be pleased to see that the Eastleigh Borough Council have installed a dog waste bin at the Weaver's Place entrance to the Flexford reserve. We have heard some dog walkers, whilst happy with its installation, question the siting of the bin. Firstly, there is another identical bin only 50yds away up the path on the other side of the road. Secondly, maybe a better location could be at either the Charlecote entrance, or the entrance adjacent to Baddesley Road, or perhaps both. For dog walkers transiting through from Charlecote to Baddesley or Valley Park, the current siting may be seen as too much of a diversion from their planned route.

It is possible that the positioning may be to do with the emptying schedule and having to go into Charlecote Drive could be a little too time consuming for the council bin lorry. The emptying of the bin, may well be why the most obvious position at the junction of the three paths within the reserve was not considered.

However, despite drawbacks, dog bins have benefits for both dog owners and the wider community. Dog bins provide a convenient and hygienic way for dog owners to dispose of their pet's waste, which can help prevent diseases. Dog bins can help reduce the amount of dog fouling in the woods, which can improve the quality of life for other visitors, especially children, cyclists, and wheelchair users. Also, dog bins can help protect the wildlife and plants in the woods, as dog waste can contain parasites, bacteria, and nutrients that can harm or disrupt the natural balance of the ecosystem.

Jon Tiller, (one of the NMDCA Committee) spoke to some of the reserve visitors who said "I wish there were bins as it would encourage walkers to pick up after dogs." - "If there was somewhere to put poo bags, I am sure they would be used". - "Do you know if there are any dog waste bins to put bags in?" Jon said "that it would be helpful for dog walkers, and hopefully encourage them to pick up after their dogs if signs were placed at the entrances to the pathways requesting walkers to consider others and pick up after their dogs, and also provide advice on where to find the bin(s). I think having more bins located at other entrances would certainly improve the situation."

TREE MENDOUS NEWS






When it was suggested to me that the walkers might like to go and look at a new piece of chainsaw art in Valley Park, I thought



that would be a great idea to use that as the focus for this month's route. As it was situated about as far away as my limiting factor of three miles, the paths used had to be fairly direct and not as circuitous as my walks can sometimes be. However, that said,

I am always grateful for the randomness of the road layouts in our area, and the number of little interconnecting paths that often you wouldn't be aware of until you are almost on top of them. Not all of them are passable all year round, so I would always pre-walk the route a day or so before hand to make sure it is suitable for the group.

I have had people say they were so busy talking they had no idea where they had been. Something people may be unaware of, is that I have been putting maps of the routes onto the website since August 2021 which I think is when we resumed our walks after the Covid restrictions. Even if you don't come along to our monthly walks, you may find the routes useful for a weekend stroll or if you are out with the dog. Just click on the 'Walks' menu on the website and scroll down to view the many options.
