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TREE-t FOR THE LOCAL NURSERY

It's been a long time coming, but eventually on Wednesday 20th December, we were able to plant our tree on the edge of the Flexford Reserve. Following our successful Platinum Jubilee event on the NMD Green, we thought it would be a nice idea to plant a tree, to commemorate the reign of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

In consultation with the Council and the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust, the location and the tree type were agreed. Following their advice, Doreen purchased a common oak (Quercus robur) from Mill Farm Trees in Cheriton. It had been suggested that the Autumn/Winter was the best time to plant it, when drought was unlikely to be a problem and roots can grow.

Armed with an assortment of garden tools, Neville and Charlie set about digging a hole big enough to accommodate the roots. Then, an excited group of children from the Little Dellwood Kindergarten, who are based in the Community Hall, helped us to refill the hole with trowels full of soil and leaf mould. Some of it ended up in the hole, and some over Neville.

Maryanne Strickland, the Kindergarten Manager said. It was an honour to be invited to this treeplanting. We had spoken with the children quite a lot over the past year or so about Queen Elizabeth, and we always place great emphasis on respecting our community and the natural world around us. Attending the tree-planting was the perfect way to tie all these themes together, and the children are still talking about the event even now! Whenever we spot a young tree whilst out on one of our woodland walks, one of the children will make a comment about "the time we planted a tree". Real-world experiences such as these are of great benefit and importance to the children, and we are so pleased that we were able to attend.

Many of you may have seen deer around the estate, and for that reason, an anti-rabbit and deer guard tube was put around the lower part of the tree. A wooden stake was hammered into the ground to support it, until it is a bit bigger.

It should thrive and grow much larger, and it may in time supply some shelter to passengers, waiting at the nearby bus stop. Hopefully, it will provide 70 years of service (or more) to the North Miller's Dale community. Maybe some of the children who helped with the planting will be around to see if that is the case!

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
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PENNY ASKS YOU TO CHECK THE TREK

likely a cyst. I was advised to leave it a month and it would go away. It didn't. I went back month after month until eventually they referred me. But the wait was 12 weeks, so I decided to go private to get it looked at, as I felt something wasn't right and was desperate. Flash forward through biopsies, scans, etc, to the 18th December 2002 when it was confirmed I had Breast Cancer. At that point, I was one of the youngest people they had ever seen with Breast Cancer, but unfortunately it is not so uncommon now. I then had a lumpectomy to remove the tumour. It had spread to my lymph nodes, so underwent chemotherapy, radiotherapy and then hormone treatment.

16 lovely years passed. I got married, had two awesome boys, and life as our family of 4 was brilliant!!

Then in August 2018, I found another lump. More tests proved that yes, unfortunately, I had it again. Not a recurrence, a new cancer. Again, more surgery, with a full removal of all my lymph nodes under my armpit, more radiotherapy, and more hormone therapy.

5 years on and I find another lump. How can this be happening again?! Back to the doctors, hospital, mammograms, biopsies.

As we are looking forward to spring, some of the things we associate with Spring are hidden in the Wordsearch.

The winter months may seem quiet for wildlife, as many species hibernate. But there is plenty we can do to support wildlife in our gardens for the species that don't. Here are some top tips on what you can do at home:



Keep fresh water flowing.

Make sure you have a fresh water source in your garden for thirsty garden visitors, by ensuring your pond or bird bath does not completely freeze over, or change water pots after a frost.

Leave garden leaves and foliage in piles.

These provide essential shelter for insects and animals. Butterflies will shelter in them to lay their eggs for spring, and toads, frogs, and hedgehogs will call these home. Early nesting birds like robins will also use this foliage to build their nests.

Avoid digging your flowerbeds.

Many insects overwinter as either eggs, larvae, or pupae near the surface of the soil. Avoid disturbing your soil over the winter months to give them the best chance for Spring.



LOCAL BOBBIES BACK ON THE BEAT

Hampshire and Isle of Wight Police and Crime Commissioner, Donna Jones, has said police relations with the public have been lost in recent years. So, a scheme, similar to Cumbria and Greater Manchester, has been rolled out across Hampshire.

Part of the new initiative to restore the link between communities and the police, is the allocation of 'Local Bobbies'. The Hampshire force has identified and allocated 99 officers. Each one has been assigned to a 'neighbourhood'.

This new scheme will ensure people know who to contact about safety and crime concerns. It will also provide ample opportunities for the community to share information and intelligence easily, ultimately, helping them to police more effectively.

Your Local Bobby is a neighbourhood policing officer dedicated to your area.

They will identify threat, harm and risk to tackle local issues and protect the community. They will investigate local crimes, and collect intelligence, working closely with partner agencies to identify the best problem-solving approach.

WHY NOT EGG-SPLORE THIS LOCAL FARM SHOP

Only a short walk from North Miller's Dale is the Egg Shed, which literally is what it says. A shed where the Hawstead Farm owners sell eggs. Ideally, though, if you are going to buy eggs from there, then a car may be a better guarantee of them getting back home intact.

In addition to the eggs, including duck eggs on occasion, they also sell some rather delicious looking cakes and biscuits. There is sometimes a selection of fresh vegetables, when



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plenty of change. They have installed CCTV to ensure the security of this system. Medium sized farm eggs are £4.50 a dozen. Take your own egg boxes or containers as they are not always available at the egg shed.

I tested out the walk along the road to the farm entrance, but quite frankly would not recommend that route, as beyond the Hursley / Hocombe Road crossroads there is no longer a pavement. Better routes

are either via the footpath through the woods at the crossroads, or up the footpath in the dip of Hook Road. Beware though, either of these routes can be muddy.

Anyone thinking of a longer walk can continue down the hill past the Farm buildings, and then across the meadows, eventually joining up with the rather busy Hursley to Ampfield Road. From there, walk back to up the Potters Heron and home via Hook Road.
